5 **Principal's Report** Principal Today was athletics carnival years 3 to 6. Thanks to Ros Harrison and Su Hill and teachers for their organisation of that carnival. Tomorrow is K-2 athletics and it will be their first athletics. Thanks to Andrea Leung, Olivia Maginnis, and Andrew Hickey for organising. Thanks to the P&C for the furniture which we are now sitting on, in Ed Doyle's room. Ed Doyle: (microphone issues) Sam Silipo on behalf of Ed: Kids are loving the new furniture, writing on the desks, forming groups, really enjoying their time. Photos will be in the newsletter and also links to a parent survey about flexible learning environments. Alex: When I've been in that room the students are so engaged in what they're doing, and self-regulating their behaviour according to which furniture they're at. Ed and Sam are going to see which areas are working well. Other teachers will come and trial that space with each other. Alex will fund other classrooms and trial different areas. Sam, Ed, Simon Matthews and Andrea Leung are instructional leaders looking into professional learning for staff in how to use those classrooms better, rolling out next week. Ultimate plan is to have this all in place for coordinating with moving into new buildings P1 and P2. The rebuild project will buy furniture for new buildings but not for heritage buildings. We don't yet know how to raise funding for this. Thanks to the P&C for the home readers which have arrived. Jess has been busy organising those into the drawers which were also purchased. Will be looking for volunteer parents in each class to help cover books. Education week will be in week 3 term 3, Tuesday 27th July. Theme this year is Lifelong Learners. Linda Ryan and enthusiastic teachers are organising events, dances, ensembles, open classrooms and other events. Also in week 3, CPS is part of the North Harbour Learning Community of schools ("NHLC"). Educational research shows schools that collaborate improve student outcomes, building capacity of teachers across the school community. NHLC has been operating for a number of years and includes Mowbray, Castle Cove, and CHS. This year there will be structured rounds rotating between schools for observation and to learn from each other. No teacher or individual student is identified in the observation notes and discussion. Fiona Johnson is leading instructional rounds along with Alex. - Last year, CPS invested \$20000 to purchase new Fountas and Pinnell guided reading books for in-class reading groups for Stage 2 and Stage 3.







All sponsorship will be done online and be cashless.


Costs:

Homework Policy Draft

P&C Presentation



Rational

Homework is important for students of all ages. It helps them reflect on what they have already learned in the classroom and prepares them for the next stage of their learning. It should be viewed by teachers, students, parents/carers and caregivers as a vital part of the home-school partnership.

A survey of parents indicated that homework is a valued activity when it is set with clear expectations, is laid out in an easy to understand format and reinforces the learning that has occurred at school. Delivery by online platforms is seen as a positive for the environment, more engaging for students and as preparation for online delivery platforms used in High School.



Purpose and Roles

Homework bridges the gap between learning at school and learning at home. It reinforces work undertaken in class. It helps develop skills such as research and time management.

Homework can help to establish the habits of study, concentration and self discipline. Homework provides challenges and stimulus to all students; including those with disability and high potential / gifted students.



Role of the Teacher

- Implement the school's Homework Policy.
- Communicate the purpose, benefits and expectations of homework to students and parents/carers/caregivers.
- Acknowledge student effort in completing homework and providing timely and relevant feedback on achievement.
- Support students having difficulties with homework.
- Discuss with students and parents/carers/caregivers any developing issues regarding a student's homework.
- Discuss homework practices with colleagues.



Role of the Student

- Attempt homework tasks.
- Maintain a well-presented record of homework.
- Discuss homework practices with parents/carers.
- Seek teacher support or clarification when required.
- Submit homework on time.



Parents

- Supporting and encouraging students in the process of learning at home.
- Communicating difficulties with homework tasks directly to teachers.

The school understands that research into the benefits of homework in primary school is inconclusive and notes that homework can be a trigger for significant family upheaval and disagreement. If the parent believes that the child has worked for a sufficient time on task, then the homework time should conclude. Homework should not interfere with children's physical activity and play and no child will be punished for not completing homework.

No homework will be set during the school holidays.



Kindergarten

In general, your child will not be expected to complete formal homework in Kindergarten. However, there are things you can do at home to help your child make the most of what they learn in Kindergarten. Reading to children at home and involving them in family activities will greatly assist the development of their skills in literacy, numeracy and problem-solving.

Home reading will commence early in Term 1 and is highly encouraged as a daily activity to reinforce learning at school. Class teachers will send home readers, sounds and sight words for students to read with parents for 5-10 minutes.



Year 1 and 2

In Years 1 and 2 some formal homework is set. For example, students may be asked to complete maths activities on *Mathletics* and reading on *Reading Eggs*, prepare news and topic talks or to complete an activity sheet.

The Home Reading Program will continue in Years 1 and 2. Children are expected to read for 10 minutes each night. Other activities including spelling should only take 5-10 minutes per night.



Years 3 to 6

Homework in Years 3-6 will be varied and students will be expected to work more independently. However, teachers will still provide guidance and assistance to students having difficulties completing their homework.

Homework for all students 3-6 is set and can be accessed on Google Classroom.

Much of the homework will be in English and mathematics and includes work set in online learning platforms that engage students with digital literacy and numeracy tasks, set by teachers, that are relevant to classroom learning. Other tasks may be set from all the Key Learning Areas of the curriculum.

Students are encouraged to read for at least 10 minutes each day and spend another 15-20 minutes on other homework activities.

Teachers may set optional work which will exceed these recommended times. Many students at Chatswood Public School enjoy this extra work. Please note: attending coaching after school is not considered as part of homework requirements.



Monitoring, evaluation and review.

This policy will be monitored and evaluated in line with current Department of Education research, expectations and guidelines.



Proposals for Expenditure

1) Aircon...

- What: Aircon for six classrooms in the BER block
- Why: Kids (and teachers) concentrate better if they're in reasonable temperature. Existing heating creates only a small warmed patch in the rooms, and there is currently no air-conditioning. DoE Asset Management do not sponsor air-conditioning.
- How Much: About \$25k
- When: As soon as quotes can be arranged and vetted.

2) Professional Development...

- What: Visible Learning professional development for teachers
- Why: Visible Learning embraces best practice in Quality Teaching and Learning, and is endorsed by CPS exec. Staff will learn to target outcomes, provide explicit criteria for students and develop quality teaching practices. Students will always know exactly what is being taught and what they must do to be successful. (A presentation can be made to a P&C meeting.)
- How Much: \$3200 for 8 days casual release for members of the Action Team
 to visit Anzac Park PS and prepare professional learning and resources for staff.
- When: After initial training, the program will take approximately 12 months to implement across the school.





Canteen Services


- We are part of the certified Healthy School Canteens network, and review all menu additions per these guidelines
